GERHARD PULVERER: COLLECTING JAPANESE ILLUSTRATED BOOKS



On a visit to Kyoto in 1969 for a scientific conference, Dr. Gerhard Pulverer and his wife, Rosemarie, discovered

the art and antique shops on Shinmonzen Street and visited the print dealer Nakamura. They returned to Germany with their first five prints, marking the beginning of a distinguished collection of Japanese art. Dr. Pulverer, a medical doctor and microbiologist educated in Vienna, was a leading biomedical research scientist. He was appointed director of the Institute of Hygiene at the University of Cologne, the position he held until his retirement in 1999.

Beginning in the 1970s, the Pulverers focused on collecting Japanese illustrated books. They were encouraged by English art expert Jack Hillier, the American scholar Roger Keyes, and Matthi Forrer, a professor at the University of Leiden, all experts on Japanese prints and books. The Pulverers often hosted scholars of Japanese art at their home, where research and discussion was accompanied by fine Mosel wines and German cuisine. Years later the Pulverers acquired a substantial part of the Japanese book collection assembled by Berlin art dealer Felix Tikotin (1895-1986). Dr. Pulverer's wish to have his renowned collection acquired by a museum where it would be conserved, researched, and exhibited was realized when the books arrived at their new permanent home, the Freer Gallery of Art. With Getty Foundation support, the museum is now developing an online catalogue that will eventually make all 2,100 volumes available to an international audience.



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Rapid Image Capture Project for the Pulverer Collection

Produced 78,000 high-resolution images in a total of sixteen weeks over two summers, 2011 and 2012.

Professor Ryo Akama's invention of a new system for supporting ehon for photography was tested, approved by conservation staff, and used on large scale for the first time.

Fixed position camera and lighting was used rather than flash. This allowed photography to proceed more rapidly. Museum professional photographers verified quality.

Two workstations were set up for photography, verification, and numbering in the same room where books were stored, rather than moving books from a storage area to a photography studio.

Graduate art history students were trained by Professor Akama and supervised by a conservator for safe handling. Dr. Matsuba conducted research on the collection and advised in special cases.

Files were downloaded and sent to the museum's photography lab for post-processing.
